Kristen Throop Presentation, April, 2018

A local artist, Kristen Throop, presented the ideas that underlie her work in a comprehensive slide presentation. She has been an artist most of her life; for the past 8 years her studio/gallery has been in the SOFA District in Santa Rosa. Uniquely, rather than focusing on a certain medium, she focuses on a single subject for the course of a year. "Ideas come first," which she often gleans from her reading. Sources such as Louise Bourgeois provide motivation; Robert Storr, former MOMA curator: "you just can't do modern or contemporary art if you don't get the ideas." The presentation covered themes that she has explored over the past several years: Cows, Bears, Technicolor Film, Cuckoo Clocks, T-Rexes and most recently Ingres' portrait of the Princess de Broglie.

The Cows theme came from a dream. She studied their physiology to the point of being comfortable painting and drawing cows doing many things. In the course of her adventure with cows, she learned how important they have been in the development of European and Asian cultures. Moving on to the Bear theme, she made detailed studies of the bear anatomy – a process to really understand what

a bear looked like. She used this same approach when she moved to the T-Rex theme, which also came from a dream. These studies enabled her to draw a T-Rex doing whatever. She also made detailed studies of the innards of a cuckoo clock when working on that theme. She has not found focus on one theme constraining but freeing – "to wake up and know I'm working on cows today". For the Technicolor series, she made 10 lightboxes and produced 143 paintings. Her work on the Ingres' Portrait has taken the form of a 3'x4' drawing and will be the subject of her upcoming July exhibit.

She uses a wide range of mediums – many of her drawings are colored pencil (she prefers Faber-Castell for their rich black), charcoal, gouache, watercolor, oil (for the bears).

Finally, she showed pictures of her Winterfest installation made up of suspended, stiffened, illuminated (from the inside)childrens clothes. One truly had to see the exhibit photos to begin to appreciate how fun and interesting it was.

Ken Berman May 2018 Demo Artist Presentation



Ken Berman is a northern California, self-taught, Outsider artist whose work combines the energy of the urban environment with the mechanics our modern age. Born in New Jersey, Ken's journey as an artist began as an undergraduate studying architecture at Lehigh University in Bethlehem, PA. where he was inspired by the raw energy and visual power of the old Bethlehem Steel Mills. As fate would have it, while studying to get his master's degree, Ken was invited to a book-signing at Robert Rauschenberg's home/studio in New York City. This chance meeting gave Ken the opportunity to speak to Robert about his life as an artist. Inspired by this encounter Ken began his own fine art career by pursuing his own artistic vision comprised of architectural and technical elements.

Over the years Ken has won many awards for his work including First Place and Best of Show awards. He has also shown his work at the prestigious Sausalito Art Festival as well as ArtExpo New York and has had the honor of showing his work in several California museums including the Crocker Museum and the Sonoma Valley Museum.

Ken's work is in many private residences throughout the world and is also included in the public collection of Keysight Technologies.

STATEMENT

Building forms and mechanical appurtenances have always interested me and are the primary inspiration for my work. Ever since I was an undergraduate at Lehigh University, surrounded by the Bethlehem Steel Mills, I have explored my own inner 'factory' with the goal of creating a visual language that articulates my own theories of art and life.

I loosely describe my artwork as Industrial with architectonic and mechanical influences referencing Cubism, Constructivism, Dadaism and the Steampunk movement. Some have misinterpreted my work as being just about machines; however, whereas the components are portrayed in a mechanical way the imagery is in fact genderless with the 'machine' representing a variety of human characteristics including strength, power and confidence.

Metaphorically, my work is about the mechanics of this modern age and the behavior of the people within it. In many ways it is a visual equivalent to Shakespeare's monologue "All the World's a Stage" from As You Like It in that the men and women of any given time are merely players in the world in which they live. With invisible algorithms and binary codes controlling much of our daily lives, the mechanics of this modern age have removed the control that people thought they had in their lives and their destiny. The unknown 'purposes' of the images incorporated in my work are meant to confront that paradigm to maintain the balance between man and machine by bringing to the forefront the key concept of being human ... abstract thought and purpose.
