Schematic: Generalized diagram, plan, or scheme

Extraterrestrial: Outside or originating outside the limits of the earth.

Widget: A small mechanical device whose name is not known or cannot be recalled.

### Member Profile with Ann Storms Watercolorist

Question: So Ann, where were you born and raised?

Ann: I was born in Santa Monica and when I was nine we moved to Venice, Southern California.

Q: Did you grow up with siblings?

A: Yes. I had three younger brothers. We were all two years apart.

Q: Did you enjoy art as a child?

A: My real passion as a child was reading. I loved horse books. I earned a pin in second grade for reading the most books.

Q: Did you have any art interest throughout your early school years?

A: Yes, I loved to draw horses. In fact, I still have the book I used as reference material.

Q: Ann, looking back to your high school days, was there anyone who influenced your art interest?

A: Yes, I had a good friend in high school, Teri Sullivan, who introduced me to watercolor. We did a lot of outdoor things together like surfing and backpacking. It was around this time she off handedly happened to show me a couple of her small, but charming watercolors.

Comment by Paula: Can you recall the subject of these favorites?

Ann: Both were of ocean waves. One was in charcoal with pencil and other was watercolor that actually featured a surfer. I like them so much she gave them to me and I still have them. Those were the paintings that launched me into dabbling in watercolor myself.

Q: Did you take art classes at this time?
A: No, but I bought a John Pike instruction book, my first and only guide for along time.

Q: Were there any other sources of inspiration for you around this time?

A: Yes. Near my home, at the Venice Pier,



there was an art gallery I often frequented. I cannot remember the artists' name, but she did fabulous watercolor portraits, I believe this made a lasting impression which sparked my life long passion for portrait watercolors.

Q: What happened next?

A: In my mid-twenties, I found myself raising my son on my own and attending a nursing program and, consequently, there was no time for art.

Q: What brought you to Sonoma County?

A: First, I worked as a nurse in a hospital in San Luis Obispo where I met my future husband. After he earned his degree in engineering, we married and moved to Sonoma County in 1990.

Q: Did you get involved with art once you moved here?

A: Yes, when I worked for Memorial Hospice I made a new friend, Sandy. She was also a nurse and she had taken a drawing class, one of many diverse classes offered by Memorial Hospital, and in doing so this ignited her passion that led her to watercolor.

Comment by Paula: I never knew Memorial Hospital offered all kinds of non-medical classes such as drawing and watercolor.

Ann: Yes, they did and I took at least two classes. One was colored pencil and the other was watercolor. Sandy and I shared this hobby of art and we soon found a couple of co-workers with similar interest and this bonded us to meet and

paint every other Saturday at Sandy's house. We also began yearly trips to Sea Ranch in the fall, renting a home by the water to sketch and draw, We did this for ten plus years.

Q: Did you ever take any other art classes once established in Sonoma County?

A: Yes, I did take several art classes along the way including Life Drawing from Maury Lapp at SRJC, plus Watercolor from Berenice Iriks and more recently from Susan Cornelius.

Q: How did you find out about AWS?

A: I befriended Jacque Mielke at our art class at Finley Center with Berenice. She invited me to be her guest at the 2017 AWS picnic at Redwood Riverfront Park. I later joined AWS in early 2018.

Conclusion by Paula: I met Ann for the first time at this years' picnic in June.. We both were sharing how much we missed Jacque Mielke. That common bond made me make a mental note to approach Ann in the future to be an interview candidate as a very new member to AWS. She was able to meet with me at my home art studio in Sebastopol. I was pleased to see her portrait watercolor samples she brought to share with this interview. Thank you, Ann, for accepting my invitation.
