AWS Board Minutes

May 20, 2021

<u>Members Present</u>: Patty Bird, Jerry Fabiano, Merrie Krisl, Gail Mardfin, Deni Marrone, Carol Mills, and Fran Nielsen.

Meeting was called to order at 10:30 by President, Carol Mills.

Possible Harvest Fair Show: The Harvest Fair will take place Friday and Saturday, Oct. 8th and 9th in the large pavilion. They will be doing wine judging and pouring and hope to get food vendors. Fair staff has left, so the board that puts this on has no one to do an art show. Carol has met with Pat Emery, who is heading up the event, and she will submit a proposal of how AWS can handle an art show for their event. Carol and Deni will look into the fair panels to see how many are available. If we do the show, all current members as of May 1, 2021 will be eligible. Carol suggested giving them 10% of sales.

Meetings: Decided to have a picnic August 19th at Riverfront Park. Patty said we have money to reserve a space and to pay for pizza, cookies, drinks, etc. Carol is waiting to hear from SCA about meeting there again. Jerry suggested meeting outside in July, perhaps at Ragle Park or the patio at SCA.

<u>Virtual Show</u>: Carol needs to report to the county on how we spent their funds. Patty asked Gail to send her a bill for doing the website. Three paintings have sold so far. Gail will show the analytics that Chris McNamara compiled at the member meeting displaying the numbers of people accessing the site. June 1 is a good time for members to send a reminder out.

Venues: Deni said the owner of the Hole in the Wall, located at 116 south near Lynch Rd. in Sebastopol, is open to having a show in his courtyard. It would accommodate 10-12 A-frames. She will look into this. Slice of Life is no longer interested and she is waiting to hear from the others. Maker's Market is the first Saturday of the month in Sebastopol. The Barlow has a well-attended street fair on the second Saturday of the month. 10x10 booths are \$150.

Program: Jerry will be off for two months starting in June. He will ask for a volunteer at the member meeting to help fill in while he is gone with prompts for July and August. June's prompt is to paint *plein air.* Being outside brings challenges, but also is a great learning experience. Some of the abstract videos from before relate to landscape. Deni will invite people to come and paint at her house.

<u>Treasurer</u>: Patty reported we have a balance of \$5166.48 in our regular account and \$8537.89 in the Meilke account, which will pay for prizes when we once again have a judge.

<u>Website</u>: Gail reminded us that we can change our pictures in June. All AWS members are encouraged to show their work there.

<u>Gravenstein Fair</u>: Fran has not heard anything since April 1. They may just have a "small bite" food event.

Meeting was adjourned at 11:50.

MAY 20, 2021 Zoom Meeting

Good to see the 22 members who made it to the May meeting, and thanks to a number of others who let us know that they couldn't attend. There're lots of good things looking ahead.

June/July/August: The AWS meetings on June 17 and July 15 will happen as pandemic-usual, via Zoom, but the August 19 meeting date will be a **Picnic Paint-Out at Riverfront Park** as in years past, with some nice changes. Instead of a barbecue or potluck, the club will provide a variety of pizzas, beverages, and individual desserts for all to enjoy at our usual Riverfront Park spot (which we have paid to reserve for the whole day this year, as many others may have the same idea). We hope some of you will come early or stay late to paint the variety of scenes at the park including two lakes — or just meander! It will be nice to be together again.

The next exciting announcement had to do with Harvest Fair, scheduled for October 8th & 9th in the big pavilion on the Sonoma County Fairgrounds in Santa Rosa. It will be a pared-down version of years past, but will include wine tasting and judging and some entertainment. Because of a change in leadership, the HF board didn't know how to handle the art aspect of the event, but our fearless leader Carol Mills, who just happens to know the man in charge of the event, offered AWS's expertise and experience in organizing art shows. The nice wood panels that have been used in the past are being tracked down, and from there we will figure how many paintings members can deliver to be hung, much as we've done for the Apple Blossom Show. All AWS members as of May 1 2021 are eligible to enter the Harvest Fair show, which will not be judged.

Big congratulations to **Karen Miller**, whose "Chard Among the Roses" was juried into the prestigious IAPS. *See page 9.*

Kathy Byrne announced the big – and getting bigger – Oakmont Art Show on June 19. See page 10. She also said her "Contemplation" watercolor had been selected for a NWWS Members' show, one of 70 out of the 400 entered. Kathy encouraged us to see the reception video, where the judge talks about each piece, explaining why she had selected it. Kathy commented she wished that that happened more often; she learned a lot by hearing the judge's process. See page 6.

Beverly Bird reminded us about Art @ the Source, to be held the first two weekends of June. Four AWS members are participating. See page 12. Fran Nielsen was excited that one of her pieces sold in the online preview show through SCA. https://www.sebarts.org/aats-exhibit

VP Jerry introduced the June prompt, a challenge for us all to GET OUT AND PAINT on location in beautiful western Sonoma County with its challenge of rapidly changing light. "No cheating," he said, reminding us to not do our landscapes in our studios, if that's what we've been used to. **See more on page 2**. People are invited and welcome to Deni Marrone's 2-acre Sebastopol property as a place to paint. **See page 9**.

Jerry announced that he will be having heart surgery on June 16 and asked for an Interim VP since he will miss a couple of meetings, but his plea got no response. The prompts will be selected another way; if you have Prompt ideas or want to research inspiring related videos, let Carol or Jerry know.

Gail reported on the Virtual Show & Sale.
Congratulations to Lorraine Stribling, Merrie Krisl, and Lonna Necker who have all sold work. Gail loves adding those red "SOLD" words on the site! She screen-shared a couple of visuals demonstrating the spike of visitors that the site gets when we promote it, and asked that everyone send out a second "push" for more visitors as we still have a month to go. Thanks to Chris McNamara who has taken an even deeper dive into the analytics.

Phil Wilkinson was our Highlighted Member this month. He created a 9-minute video that walked us through the various parts of his studio and several of his artworks. Beginning with photography, which Phil modifies for aesthetic purposes, he has taken courses in several other media and his hobby is woodworking (think frame-making). Not to mention his foray into embellishing with paint a variety of stringed instruments from cellos to ukeleles!

We all had printer envy when he showed us his nearprofessional Epson printer, which can handle large paper and canvas. Phil loves flowers (he and Julia have a lovely garden), which inspire many of his photographs, and he shared several landscapes and shorelines he did *Cont'd on next page*

Congratulations, Karen!!

"OMG! I got in to the IAPS show in Chicago!!!!" Karen Miller exclaimed in an email when she heard her CHARD AMONGST THE ROSES was accepted and she had to mark the piece "NFS" on her Virtual Show page. "They said to take the entry out of circulation but I didn't cuz my chances of getting in were so minuscule, but here we are. I am beyond thrilled!"

She explains, "IAPS is International Association of Pastel Societies, made up of 93 societies from all over the world. Only about 150 paintings were chosen last year, which tells you why I didn't think I'd get in. I only submitted the one painting because I didn't want to waste too much money in fees."

Winning has its price, too. At the May meeting, Karen said the cost to ship her pastel under glass was more than \$200. Sounds like money well spent.





Eric Carle, the legendary American designer, illustrator and author of more than 70 children's books, died on May 23 at age 91. Carle was behind beloved children's classics such as "The Very Hungry Caterpillar," "Brown Bear, Brown Bear, What Do You See?" and "The Very Busy Spider." The Very Hungry Caterpillar" was published in 1969 and has sold more than 50 million copies in at least 62 languages. He'd been punching holes in a stack of paper when the idea came to him of a


bookworm (originally) who eats a book over the course of a week. The pages would include holes for children to poke their fingers through.

In 2002, Carle and his late wife Barbara founded the **Eric Carle Museum of Picture Book Art** a nonprofit in Amherst, Massachusetts, that seeks to "inspire a love of art and reading through picture books." ••• Read more about his unusual life story (he was forced to dig trenches for the Nazis as a teen!) here: https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Eric_Carle

Member Profile: Rod Morgan

Paula: So, Rod, where were you born and raised?

Rod: I was born in Alamosa, Colorado. I was raised nearby in a small town, Sanford, 750 population. Later, I grew up in Citrus Heights in California.

P: Did you grow up with siblings?

R: Yes, I have an older brother, two younger brothers and a baby sister. Then after my dad got remarried, he had two more sons, who are my half brothers.

P: Did you have relatives who were artists?

R: No. They were ranchers, farmers and railroad workers.

P: Can you recall, as a child, what you wanted to be when you grew up and what did you actually end up doing?

R: Yes, I wanted to be an artist in graphic design kinds of things. So architecture became one of my goals. But then I wanted to be a civil engineer and build the big stuff. My problem was the math became overwhelming! That was when I was attending American River Junior College. It was at that time I realized I had enough of school and ended up being drafted and was sent to South Korea as a finance clerk for the army.

P: When did you first become interested in art?

R: When I was 6 or 7 I did a "Moon Garden" drawing that my mom hung on the refrigerator for years and I later found that she kept it stored away for her whole life. I was attracted to the design factor of everything! In high school, the descriptive side of geometry intrigued me but not the math part. I understood it, but this did not hold my interest.

P: What actually inspired you to begin to take your art interest seriously?

R: It started in junior high with production art. This involved the creation of all the school posters like calendars and event posters. In high school, I took three years of drafting and the fourth year in architecture. In junior college, I took descriptive geometry. This was learning how to draw 3-dimensional objects in space. I especially remember learning about M.C. Escher and his visions of a geometrically warped world. Through drafting and descriptive geometry classes, I began to explore my own world of geometric constructions and optical illusions. My passion still lies in combining repeating patterns, interlocking and intertwining endless loops into sculptures that represent my personal genre entitled "Division of Space."

P: After you finished your military obligation with the army, what happened after that?

R: I knew I had to go back to school so I enrolled in Utah Valley University where many of my first cousins lived. I earned an AAS degree in Graphic Arts and an AS in Journalism.

P: Did that evolve into other art mediums?

R: Yes, I elected to take a techniques class for my graphic design field. This involved learning a new technique every week such as airbrush, silkscreen, scratchboard, painting with oil, watercolor and pastels, and learning the frosted mylar process which was totally new to me.

P: Do you have any other creative outlets that you'd like to share?

R: Yes. I am currently writing a book: **Tales from the Trapezoid!** Another passion of mine is photography. I graduated from the Glen Fishback Photography School in Sacramento in 1981. I am also developing an art book of optical illusions.

P: How long have you lived in Sonoma County?

R: I came here to help my brother who lives in Rohnert Park and I am still here. That was in March of 2018.

P: How did you find out about AWS?

R: It was through the Sebastopol Center of the Arts. I went there in person and the woman at the desk explained that AWS is an art club that meets right down the hall on the third Thursday of the month around noon. So I visited as a guest of Bob Hart and I soon joined as a member.

Conclusion by Paula

Meeting Rod for this interview was a real eye opener for me on a level I have never experienced from any other interview candidate. His specialty of working with wood and other materials, has expanded my awareness of his special kinds of sculpture. I learned a lot from his life story and I applaud him for his creative mastery and accomplishments. Thank you Rod for sharing your expertise, many samples of your work, your photography and short stories. I hope I have summarized it all adequately for the enjoyment of our members.



Art at the Source Open Studios June 5-6 & 12-13, 2021

will see in person the three paintings she has in the AWS Virtual Show, as well as many more. As Fran says, "It would be nice for all of us to see some familiar faces." Follow

It's always fun to visit the preview shows, where you can get a taste of several of the artists in one place: May 7-June 26 at Corrick's/My Daughter the Framer in Santa Rosa; June 1-27 at Gallery One in Petaluma; and June 1-25 at Oli Gallery in Guerneville.





Art & Object: A ROSE IS A ROSE IS A ROSE

Many AWS artists like to paint roses, and may find this little slide show informative:

Rose Symbolism Throughout History.
