2/20/20 Demo by Patrick Fanning, Watercolor

information gained from his 25 years of experience as a realistic watercolor painter. He generously shared his approaches to painting, his tools, his palette, and a number of "tricks of the trade" with AWS members present, as well as more than ten guests who came to learn from the demonstration. **Approach:** Patrick's sketches on location are the basis of his realistic

The watercolor demo by Patrick Fanning was inspiring and packed with

works, often taking longer than the painting, generally more than an hour. He explained and demonstrated his three-stage approach to painting:

1) Washes covering most of the paper support, using a large brush and laying in an underpainting. He prefers synthetic brushes for this step as they are better for pushing the water down into the grooves of the paper. The demo was based on a foggy day photo and during this phase he saved the round sun shape in the upper right quadrant.

"What it comes down to is practice."



- 2) Add mid-values. Here he darkened the foreground shape and midground tree ridge and began creating the main tree shape, which would become the darkest dark against the lightest light (sun), creating the focal point.
- 3) Final stage, adding darks and details. He builds layer upon layer like "layering stained glass." Since watercolor is transparent, one has to remember that what you put down in the beginning shows up at the end. As to composition, he works to cluster interest in the "four hotspots."

Paper Support: He prefers 300 lb Arches cold press paper, but he used 160 lb for the demo. He clips his paper to his backing board (rather than taping), so he can move the clips as the paper stretches.

Easel: He uses a modified half-French easel on location, and works on a table in his studio — with water jars, paper towels, palette, etc. always in the same arrangement to create ease in working. "Nothing can replace familiarity with materials," he pointed out.

Palette: He uses a palette designed by Steve Quiller because it is round (like a color wheel) and it has a very tightly fitting lid, and he designed his own color disk. Patrick uses all high intensity colors on his palette:


Cadmium Yellow, Cadmium Orange, Cadmium Scarlett, Cadmium Red, Quinacridone Rose, Permanent Magenta, Dioxazine Violet, Ultramarine Blue, Winsor Blue, Cobalt Turquoise, Viridian, and Sap Green. Earth colors can be mixed from these colors.

"Usually the time to stop a watercolor is 10 minutes ago."

Detailing: Using a one and a half inch brush, he created tree shapes which he


likened to a hand shape — asymmetry is important. His blackberry bushes appeared after laying in a broad dark brush stroke and then turning the painting upside down, pulling out the brambles with the handle of his brush. "Nothing replaces familiarity with materials," he pointed out. (continued)





Patrick finished out his presentation by discussing the process and techniques used in some of the finished paintings he presented at the demo. Viewers were also able to look at two sketchbooks he passed around and a book he has published called *Travel Sketching*.





I was honored (and surprised!) to have my piece judged Best in Show in the National Arts
Program Foundation contest, a city-wide Santa Rosa art exhibit, now up at the Finley Center through March 27.
I was told the two judges kept returning

to view my piece *Eight Radishes*, one of whom was Kristen Throop, a quest artist at AWS in April 2018.

The watercolor is about 12x12 and was created using Masa paper (rice paper with a backing), crumpled up, water-soaked, and wrung out before painting, creating a batik-like effect. It was an experimental technique I was being taught and as I worked on it, I was thinking "This is so much fun!!" It was the JOY infused in the painting that attracted the judges, in my opinion.

The Press Democrat gave the show great coverage in its 2/21/20 issue, including a big picture of Yours Truly (not so much the painting)! It was fun to hear from so many friends I've made since moving here 4 1/2 years ago, congratulating me on the award. The best part was being contacted by a friend from 25 years ago; neither of us knew we lived in Santa Rosa, and now we have reconnected, which is a sweet result of such "fame!"

Member Profile with Fran Nielsen

Paula: So, Fran, where were you born and raised?

Fran: I am second generation Sebastopol born and basically have lived in this house since I was two years old.

P: Did you grow up with siblings?

F: Yes, I have two older sisters. One is four years older, Marjorie, and the other sister, Claudia, is ten years older than me.

P: Did you have relatives who were artists?

F: Yes, Marjorie was quite artistically talented as she designed and built custom dollhouses and sold them at craft fairs. Later on in life, she excelled in designing and constructing high-end handbags.

P: Can you recall any art projects from school??

F: Yes, in high school, for school dances I would usually do the decorations. My favorite memory was making a life size suit of armor out of cardboard and then painting it silver. A photo of it was in the yearbook. Those experiences served me well for a future involvement with the California Junior Miss Scholarship Program, which included a full stage production with music, dancing and set designs. That was my forté. I was art director for the stage sets for over 12 years.

P: Fran, did you major in art in school?

F: At Analy High School, I took art classes all the way through and earned a certificate of excellence in art upon graduation. But even as a young child, I drew all the time.

P: Did you move on into a college setting after high school?

F: No, because I married my high school sweetheart at age 18 and we had our first of three sons when I was 20.

P: Your studio space is very well organized with all these cupboards, drawers and closets. Do you do something else in here besides paint?

F: Yes! I first started making soft sculpture dolls many years ago and I made that my focus using holiday craft shows as my sales platform. That eventually evolved into my sculpting the dolls' faces with polymer clay.

P: What inspired you to create these character figures?

F: I always loved Beatrix Potter's characters and *Wind in* the Willows characters, so those were my impetus.

P: So was that your full time occupation?

F: Not exactly, as I had a full time job in Santa Rosa at a school supply retail store for ten years until 1994.

P: What led you to painting?

F: In the 60's I was especially attracted to the Keene style of portraiture with the big eyes and I experimented with a similar style back then. That got me started in landscape painting. Then I happened to gift one of my sons a painting for Christmas one year. After that, he wanted a painting every year. I started out using lousy craft paint because that is what I had on hand. Then I started using better paint and my favorite paint is Liquitex.

P: I have always admired your realistic excellence in your paintings. Did you ever paint on-location for some of your landscape pieces?

F: No, but I paint from my own photographs.

P: How did you find out about AWS?

F: In 2008, I met Arlene Parnay as a mutual artist showing at a local winery. Arlene suggested I come to an AWS meeting to get acquainted. I feel that was one of the best decisions I ever made.

P: Why do you say that?

F: As a self-taught artist, I never had formal art training in my background. So the programs that we have, provide excellent instruction. In addition to that, I now have other art venues for showing and selling my artwork.

Conclusion by Paula:

We've all missed you, Fran, since your recent knee replacement surgeries. It was good having time with you for

this second interview after many years. Thanks for dredging up the original interview from your archives. It was good to use it and combine our recent comments.

Fran, thank you again for all you do as Corresponding Secretary and for leading our club's participation each August in the Gravenstein Apple Fair. You are very much appreciated by all of us at AWS. We look forward to seeing you again soon at our

meetings sitting up at the head

table with our other board

members.
