### FROM PRESIDENT JUDY GRIGG GOLDBERG

Hello to a November to remember! Going back to the future... will the future be going back...?

Anni Albers, a fiber artist who taught at the Black Mountain School, believed that "modern civilization caused us to lose touch with our own creativity." She wrote that "we must come down to earth from the clouds where we live in vagueness, and experience the most real thing there is: MATERIAL." That was 86 years ago!

Mom frequently ran off to the fabric store to get material, so I have been aware of the word "material" as *cloth* since childhood. Until now, I haven't given much thought about what "getting material" means for different people doing different things or thinking of its importance to the making of art. *Material is never immaterial!* 

According to **Annie Dillard**, painter and writer, it benefits us as artists to have a "kind of sensual relationship with our material." If we just love it for whatever reason, our materials will lead us. We will have more patience to persevere, be inspired to try new ideas and come to love the process and the work. Mom just loved her fabric.

Appreciation, out of necessity, can grow into love for the materials if that is all that is available. The **Pomo people**, native to Northern California, used what nature provided to craft items needed for their everyday life...from infant carriers to fish traps. In time their beautiful intricate basketry evolved into a fine art form.

During the October meeting, AWS members were given a wonderful opportunity. With instruction and individual help from member **Sally Privette**, we learned how to begin and hopefully finish making a traditional Pomo basket from pine needles and raffia. There was a feeling of camaraderie and excitement for learning something new and appreciation for the history and culture behind the art. We are so very grateful.



#### What are the materials? What are the tools? What is the art?

The fading of the Arts and Crafts movement could have prompted Albers' scold about artists "living vaguely in the clouds." With her art form being of very tangible threads, did she feel that for art to be real it must have actual substance. The boundaries of categories of creation are merging and shifting with new materials, new tools, and new forms of original art.

What would Anni think of our art world today... digital art, A.I., my current read downloaded from the library, and me writing this using my iPad?!

Oh, then...there is... "The Cloud"!









## OCTOBER WORKSHOP/DEMO: SALLY PRIVETTE, BASKETRY

Sally Privette and her apt assistant, Judy Leandro, led us on a basket weaving adventure. Sally's fascination with baskets started when she acquired a Miwok Cradleboard. She began by collecting baskets and then started making them in 1972 when she attended a living history program at the Petaluma Adobe. She increased her skills through working with Mabel McCay, a member of the Long Valley Cache Creek Pomo renowned for her basket weaving.

"Form follows function" Sally repeated, pointing to the many forms basketry can take. Much of her collection is classic basket forms, but there are also bags, fans, fishing tools, and jewelry; the possibilities of basketry seem endless.

Sally demonstrated the **coiling method** of basket weaving, working with pine needles and raffia. First, she discussed the foraging of plants and shared hand-on-hand bunches of long pine needles foraged from the north of here.


She and Judy showed the small crowd gathered how to begin a coiled basket (See Step 1 photo). She chose 3-4 pine needles (moistened, and the longer, the better), and then starting with the heads, began wrapping them with raffia (also moist, which could also be split).

To secure the first coil, a sewing needle was threaded with raffia, and looped over the now-curved pine needle bunch. Continuing on, the raffia is pulled tight at regular intervals and wrapped around the next coiled row. One can attach a center "belly button" — a button, charm, jewelry item, etc. — at the beginning or later in the process.

Sally offered us an introduction to the ancient art of basket weaving, from the foraging to the finishing, and some inspired AWS participants went on to complete theirs at home (see photos below).

## Member Profile: Phil Wilkinson by Barbara Evans

#### **Early Influences**

Phil welcomed me in his beautiful, art-filled home in Oakmont. I was immediately drawn to the lush, flower-filled backyard, where I met his wife Julia who kindly offered me a box of iris rhizomes. Then Phil showed me his glorious art studio! Colorful paintings and photographs adorned the walls and Phil's large easel displayed an in-progress pastel landscape. We immediately launched into an in-depth discussion of underpainting, materials, and process, when I stopped Phil and said I didn't know a word he had used. Phil explained he was from Australia and re-pronounced the word so I could understand. Ahh, sorry, we must back up because Australia is almost as exciting as pastel shop talk!

Phil was born in Adelaide and spent his youth living in several rural towns in Southern Australia, moving with his father's government railroad career. Phil took to photography, following his father's passion. He was drawn to the rich landscapes of wheat fields, water and trees that surrounded him, his preferred subjects.

#### **More Time for Art**

As a child he wanted to be a pilot, then a physicist, ultimately becoming an anesthesiologist. He spent 7 years at UCSF then moved to Santa Rosa Memorial Hospital's heart surgery team. Retiring 9 years ago afforded him much more time for his photography as well as painting (watercolor and now mostly oil), drawing, and pastel. Phil has been president of the 150 member Oakmont Art Association, a group similar to AWS, for the last 9 or 10 years. He was also president of Artists' Round Table of Sonoma County.

#### **Disciplined Process with Multiple Mediums**

Moving around the studio, we discussed some of Phil's works. He likes to use sanded surfaces (600 grit) for his

pastels. He's taken classes and learned from Karen Margulis (online), Richard McDaniel, Clark Mitchell, Liz Haywood-Sullivan, and Albert Handel, whose color scheme he admires and uses as inspiration for his own works. Phil establishes tones with NuPastels, then uses alcohol to get drips and random effects on his underpainting. He may then brush on clear gesso to create texture, using marks to suggest intended



form such as foreground grasses. He lays in a mix of blue, green, and violet for the darkest darks, then works mid and light tones, saving highlights, small details, and sharp edges for last. He also uses Rembrandt and Sennelier brands — and blends with bits of high density foam pipe insulation!

Phil's oil paintings feature rich landscapes and he recently switched to water mixable oils (Georgian and Cobra brands) and hasn't noticed any downside vs. traditional oils. He learned from Monique Carr to first do an acrylic underpainting which establishes "the whole version" and dries quickly, an approach preferable to working top down or by section. He uses a layered approach, similar to his pastels, with darks first, then light and medium value shapes. Next he adds "sky holes" in trees, chooses edges to blur or sharpen, and adds highlights last. Phil has also painted watercolors, including some beautiful canal and architectural scenes from travel to southern France.

#### **Digital Painting**

Being a photographer since his teens, Phil recently switched to a mirrorless Panasonic Lumix camera. His subjects include sea and landscapes plus macro photography of insects and flowers. Using Photoshop's "find edges" filter, he creates eye-catching digital paintings where he selectively reveals parts of an image, such as foliage in line work (edges), while leaving the subject such as the main flower, original. He makes his own prints, including on canvas, with an Epson SureColor P600 printer.

#### **Painting on Instruments and Woodworking**

While Phil paints mostly on birch panels or canvas, he also paints *violins* with colorful scenes. He donated a painted cello to the Santa Rosa Symphony and it was auctioned for over \$2,000. Phil is a woodworker and makes finely crafted stands for these instruments as well as his own frames! He showed me his technique of cutting moldings with one of his three miter saws and explained how the wider the frame, the more precise the 45° angle must be.

Phil owns two watercolors by AWS member **Kathy Byrne** and admires abstract painters such as AWS member **Linda Reid**. Abstraction and keeping paintings loose are his challenges that I am sure some of us share. Phil is a multitalented artist and always a friendly presence at our meetings.

Thank you Phil for sharing your gifts and knowledge with
