


Don't forget to send photos of paintings or other art you are doing to Gail so she can screen-share them at our meeting on September 16th.

Marilyn suggested the work of Matisse for inspiration; see illustration at right.







MANDY BANKSON

During the first year I lived in Santa Rosa, I availed myself of the chance to explore the area by going on that spring's artist studio tour. I discovered the work of MANDY BANKSON, who does wonderful abstract paintings of all sizes. I have been to a few of her openings in the area since and always stop by her studio when the tours are on if I am around. I admire the way she uses composition, color, and various marks, patterns, and blends in her pieces. So I am on her email list, and I wanted to share some words/ideas she recently wrote:

In the midst of painting I sometimes realize I am learning lessons that apply to life.

I often marvel at the surprises that happen when a new color or shape completely changes the composition. I am open to such surprises; in fact I thrive on them.

I work in ways that help me to let go - like pushing paint with a trowel, so that shapes are created without my controlling them.

I then work with what I allowed to happen. Sometimes it takes stopping and just looking - not something that comes naturally to me.

I am most comfortable in motion. But as I sit and look, I begin to see more. It reminds me of the sensation of getting out of a pool with water in my eyes. When my eyes clear, things come into focus. Then the next step comes into view - so obvious once I see it.

I am a woman with to do lists. Yet I have chosen a painting process that is in contrast to my daily life.

So what do I learn from my studio practice?

- To relish the surprises that each day brings and take advantage of them.
- To be on the lookout for how one thing can change my perspective or understanding.
- To be willing to stop and look closely
